O. 10. What Houfes are to he huilt this Year?
Q. 20. Does the General Deed require any Alteration in the Mode of fettling our Preaching. Houres?
A. None, except the Infertion of the Phrafe, "The Confererice of the People called Metho"dilts, as eftabliihed by a Deed-Foll of the faid J. " Wefley, under his Hand and Seal, bearing Date " the 28th Day of February, in the Year ${ }^{1784}$, and " enrolled in his Majefty's High Court of Chance"ry, and no others," inftead of the Phrafe, "The "Conference of the People called Methodifts, in "London, Briftol, or Leeds, and no others."
Q. 21. Is there any further Direction to be given, to fecure the proper Settlement of our Preach-ing-Houfes?
A. Let no Affiftant make, or fuffer to be made, in his refpective Circuit, a Collection for any Preaching-Houfe, till every Step be previoully taken to fecure it on the Conferenee-Plan, by a TruftDeed, a Bond, or fufficient Articles of Agreement.
Q. 22. Directions are given in the Minutes concerning the Windows, \&c. of Preaching-Houfes: Have thofe Directions been obferved?
A. In fome Places they have; in others, not at all, particularly with regard to the Windows, Doors, Pews, and the dividing of the Men from the Women.
Q. 23. Shall we infift on the. Obfervance of thele Directions for the Time to come, or no ?
A. We will permit none to collect for any future Building, unlefs Security be firf given to obferve the Rules laid down in the large Minutes.
Q. 24. When and where is the next Conference to be held?
A. At Manchefter, on the lan Tuefday in next July. And all fucceeding Conferences are to be held in the following Order, viz.- 1 ft . in London ; 2dly, in Leeds; 3dly, in Britol ; 4thly, in Manchefter. .

Of Separation from the Church.
Aug. 30, $17^{85} 5^{\circ}$

1. Ever fince I returned from America, it has been warmly affirined, ": You feparate from the Church." I would confider, How far, and in what Senfe, this Affertion is true.
2. Whether you mean by that Term the Building fo called, or the Congregation, it is plain I do not feparate from either: For wherever I am, I go to the Church, and join with the Congregation.
3. Yet it is true that I have in fome Relpects variod, tho' not from the Doctrines, yet from the Difcipline of the Church of England ; altho' not willingly, but by Conftaint. For inftance: Above Forty Years ago I began Preaching in the Fields; and that for Two Reafons-Firf, I was not fuffered to preach in the Churches: Secondly, No Parifh Church in London or Weftmingter could contain the Congrega. tion.
4. About the fame Time feveral Perfons who were defirous to fave their Souls, prayed me to meet them apart from the great Congregation. Thefe little Companies (Societies they were called) gradually fpread through the Three Kingdoms. And in many Places they built Houfes in which they met, and wherein I and my Brethren preached. For a few young Men, one after another, defired to ferve me, as. Sons in the Gofpel.
5. Some Time after, Mr. Deleznot, a Clergyman, defired me to officiate at his Chapel, in Wapping. There I read Prayers, and preached, and adminiltered the Lord's Supper, to a Part of the Society. The Reft communicated either at St. Paul's, or at their feveral Parifh Churches. Meantime, I endeavoured to watch over all their Souls, as one that was to give an Accmunt: and to affien to each of
6. When thefe were multiplied, I gave them an Invitation to meet me together in my Houfe at London: That we might confider, in what Manner we could moft effectually fave our oum Soul, and them that heard us. This we called, a Conference. (meaning thereby, the Perfons, not the Converfation they had.) At firft I defired all the Preachers to: meet me; but afterwards only a felect Number. .7. Some Years after, we were ftrongly importuned by our Brethren in America, to "Come over and help them." Several Preachers willingly of fered themfelves for the Service; and feveral went from Time to Time. God bleffed their Labours in an uncommon Manner. Many Sinners were converted to God: And many Socicties formed, under the fame Rules as were otferved in England: Infomuch, that at prefent the American Societies contain more than Eighteen Thoufand Members.
7. But fince the late Revolution in North America, thefe have been in great Diftrefs, The Clergy having no Suftenance, either from England, or from the American States, have been obliged almoft univerfally to leave the Country, and feek their Food elfewhere. Hence thofe who had been Mcmbers of the Church, had none either to adminifter the Lord's Supper, or to baptize their Children. They applied to England over and over: But it was to no Purpofe. Judging this to be a Cafe of realNeceffity, I took a ftep, which for Peace and Quietnefs, I had refrained from taking for many Years: I exerciled that Power, which I am fully perfuaded the Great Shepherd and Bifhop of the Church has given me. I appointed three of our Labourers to ge and help them by not only preaching the Word of God, but likewile adminiftring the Lord's Supper and baptizing their Children, throughout that vaft Tract of Land, a thoufand Miles long, and fome hundreds Broad.

3. Thefe

3. Thefe are the Steps. which not of Choicebut Neceffity, I have flowly and deliberately taken. If any one is pleafed to call this feparating from the Church, he may. But the Law of England does not call it fo; nor can any one properly be faid fo to do, unlefs out of Confcience he refufes to join: in the Service, and partake of the Sacraments adminiftered therein.

After Dr. Coke's return from America, many of our Friends begg'd I would confider the Cafe of Scotland, where we had been labouring fo many Years, and had feen fo little Fruit of our Labours. Multitudes indeed have fet out well, but they were foon turned out of the Way : chiefly by their Minifters either difputing againft the Truth, or refufing to admit them to the Lord's Supper, yea or to baptize their Children, unlefs they would promife to have no Fellowfhip with the Methodifts. Many who did fo, foon loft all they had gained, and became more the Children of Hell than before. To prevent this, I at length confented to take the fame Step with regard to Scotland, which I had done with regard to America. But this is not a Separation from the Church at all. Not from the Church of Scotland, for we were never connetted therewith, any further than we are now : not from the Church of England, for this is not concern'd in the Steps which are talen in Scotland. Whatever then is done either in América or Scotland, is no Separation from the Church of England. I have no thought of this: I have many Objections againft it. It is a totally different Cafe. :" But for all this is itint noffible there mav he fuch
good I can while I live, for fear of Evils that may follow when I am dead."

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Perhaps there is one Part of what I wrote fome Time fince which requires a little further Explanation. In what Cafes do we allow of Service in Church Hours? I anfwer

1. When the Minifter is a notorioully wicked Man.
2. When he preaches Arian, or any equally pernicious Dotrine.
3. When there are not Churches in the Town Surficient to contain half the People: And
4. When there is no Church at all within two or three Miles. And we advife every one who preaches in the Church-Hours to read the Pfalms and Leffons with Part of the Church Prayers: Becaufe we apprehend this will endear the Church Service to our Brethren, who probably would be prejudiced againft it, if they heard none but extemporary Prayer.

> A few little Advices I would add to the Preachers.

> I advife the Affiftants
> 1. To re-eftablifh Morning Preaching, in all large Towns, at leaft.
2. To exert themfelves in reftoring the Bands.
3. And the Select Societies.
4. Change both a General and Particular Steward in each Circuit:
$\because$ I advife all the Preachers.

1. Always to conclude the Service in ahout an Hour.
2. Never fcream.
3. Never lean upon, or beat the Bible.
:4. Wherever you preach, meet the Scciety.

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5. Do not, without the utmof Neceffity, go. Home at Night.
6. Never take Part againft the Affiftant.
7. Never preach a Funeral Sermon, but for an eminently holy Perfon: Nor then, without confulting the Affiftant. Preach none for hire: Beware of Panegyric, particularly in London:
8. Have Love-Feafts in more Places.

9: Introduce no new. Tunes. See that none fing. too flow, and the Women fing their Parts. Exhort. all to fing, and all to ftand at Singing, as well as tokneel at Prayers.
10. Let none repeat the laft Line, unlefs the Preacher does.
11. Inform the Leaders, that every Affiftant is to: change both the Stewards and Leaders when he fees good. And that no Leader has Power to put any Perfon either into or out of the Society.
